
Art Class








Each day of school missed makes a difference, with the effect on learning accumulating over time. From an early age, if children are taught that they need to 'show up' for school and make a commitment, this positive mentality aids academic and career success and brings benefits in adulthood.

Did you know:

- missing half a day of school each week equates to one month of missed learning each year
- the attendance habits set by children when they first start school continue throughout their school life
- if children miss half a day of school each week between Pre-primary and Year 10, they would miss almost one full year of learning learning is cumulative if children miss a day, it is harder for them to catch up.

EVALUATE OURSELVES

As parents and educators, we play a huge role in a child's character development. So we need to ask ourselves regularly: are we self-aware enough of our own temperament in order to allow children to learn at their own speed? Do we actively listen? Are we compassionate, respectful and empathetic? Do we empower them to solve problems rather than rushing in to solve it for them? Do we honour their spirits, giving them enough space to be who they are?

TALK ABOUT PEACE

Ask children what they think it means. You may be amazed by their answers! In turn, they will be surprised to learn that peace can be found in many places, and does not only refer to world peace.

GRACE AND COURTESY

How to greet someone, when to say 'excuse me', asking for help politely, cleaning up after yourself, knowing what to do if you are feeling angry, knowing how to tell someone you want to be alone, understanding the concept of agreeing to disagree, sneezing or blowing your nose correctly—these simple things provide the framework for modelling peace.

RESPECT DIVERSITY

Emphasise respect for the diversity of traditions and customs of people of other cultures.

PRACTISE GRATITUDE

Ask questions to get children thinking of all the things they have to be grateful for. Encourage them to record one thing each day they feel grateful for.

PROVIDE A QUIET CORNER

Even the most extroverted person needs a space to be able to slow down. Ideally it is a corner with natural light, a comfortable chair or cushions, maybe a book to read or headphones for music to listen to. Or it may be a designated outdoor space. The possibilities are endless.

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

Teach children ways to care for the environment and reduce waste in order to keep peace with Mother Earth.

FORGIVE QUICKLY

Nursing a grudge is wasted time. Show children how to let it go and get on with things.

A CARING MINDSET

Children come to understand the importance of peace by learning to take care of their home and classroom, as well as others around them. Give children meaningful tasks that are beneficial to their home and classroom.
